Ernest Keith Kelly KC5AS

Keith Kelly, 75, died October 31, 2013 with his loved ones at his side after battling cancer for five years. He was born Ernest Keith Kelly in Venice, IL on October 16, 1938 and had lived in Florida for 15 years, splitting his time between homes in Naples and Port Charlotte. Previously he had lived in St. Louis, Chicago, London, and the Houston area with his wife, Deanna, and their two boys before he moved to Anna Maria Island and later to Naples.

He was predeceased by his mother, Lettie T. Kelly; and his father, Ernest J. Kelly.

He is survived by Mana Holtz, his 'Sweetie' of 13 years; sons, Bryan (Kim) of Houston, TX and Darren (Dana) of Louisville, CO; grandchildren, Celeste and Dylan; sister,

Glenda (Kelly) Madden of Bonita Springs; and many nieces and nephews.

Keith earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemical Engineering from Southern Illinois University, while working full-time and helping raise two boys. He worked as a chemist at Granite City Steel and as a fire safety engineer for a variety of companies. He then created his own company as a fire protection consultant for several oil companies. He joked that he retired the first time at age 48, then again at age 52, and finally at age 60.

He loved spending time with Mana at their Port Charlotte home on the water, where they kept their Sea Ray for longer trips and their small catamaran for fishing. They often had bets on who caught the first fish, the biggest fish and the most fish. (He didn't always win.)

A master joke-teller, Keith was known for his quick wit, his charm, his cooking skills, and his fabulous hair. In addition to fishing, he loved boating, having spent years on his Californian and then enjoying many 'getaways' with Marine Max and other Sea Ray owners. He loved to read and had traveled extensively throughout the world, both for his job and his personal pleasure. He spent two years living in London, and worked extensively in the North Sea, the Middle East, South America, Africa and Russia, designing and inspecting fire protection systems. He was also an instructor at Texas A & M's Fire Safety School for several years.

In high school, Keith became interested in ham radios and soon earned his operator's license. He was a lifelong ham radio operator and was active in The Englewood Amateur

Radio Society, where he developed many close friendships. On Tuesday mornings he looked forward to getting together with his amateur radio buddies for breakfast. Over the years he collected old radios and took great pleasure in them.

A humble, soft-spoken man, he was a creative chef and was Mr. Fix-it around the house. He loved to dance, especially the jitterbug, and had a good time wherever he was. He had a joke for every occasion and would fascinate friends with his stories about his work experiences in exotic locations. He was also a very caring man, and for years he played Santa Claus on Christmas morning at the Shelter for Abused Women and Children, passing out gifts to the grateful residents.

Per his wishes, there will be no funeral service.

A celebration of his life will be planned at a later date.


