



A Shell Story by Grant Walker



The Beach re-nourishment process on the South end of Manasota Key between Englewood Beach and Blind Pass Beach is progressing very quickly. Those who have access to the beach are absolutely amazed. Anita Wilson reports that the beach at the Englewood Gardens Club where we usually have our April club picnic is twice as wide as she has ever seen it in the 20 plus years she has lived here.



"Linda Masterson and I walked there March 24 and were able to walk farther along the beach going north than we have been able to walk in years. And the beach was littered with thousands of kitten paw shells! There were several fighting conch, more Venus shells than usual and a lovely lightning whelk, our club shell," says Anita.

The Shell of the Month for April might well be the Incongruous

Ark, (Anadara brasiliana). Incongruous means "not in harmony," certainly an understatement for these times we face right now. But how or why did an ark of our shores get this name? They are cute little shells; they seem in harmony with each other. Maybe the folks naming shells just ran out of names, since Florida is blessed with so many ark species. They are fairly similar to other small, white ribbed arks here, the eared, cut-ribbed and white miniature arks. Then there are the larger, thicker-shelled arks that usually have a black perioscracum-the ponderous, blood and transverse arks. Ponderous is a rather interesting name as well. Not at all like the whimsical turkey wing or the mossy and red brown that are definitely descriptive.

Do you have an incongruous ark identified in your collection? They are an inch long or less, are thin shelled compared with most arks and have strong radial ribs and distinct dash-shaped beads, according to Blain and Dawn Witherington. Their book *Florida's Living Beaches* says they live within the sandy bottoms near shore.

May our lives be back in harmony before long.
