


**4)** Either e-mail or text Karen your video message. (Her e-mail address and phone number are both located on the Englewood Shell Club website's Members Only page.)

### **FEBRUARY GUEST, CARMI THOMPSON** Will talk about Cenozoic *Aturia* from the State of Florida

Carmi's research focuses on the nautiloid genus Aturia across Cenozoic surficial deposits of Florida. While mollusks are common in Florida's surficial deposits, reports of cephalopods are rare. Of particular note are the cephalopods discovered in Oligocene deposits, which preserve as silicified phragmocones (the chambered portion of the animal) in concretions. These occurrences are unusual, as they have only been reported from a single locality in the state of Florida. The ultimate goals of this research project are to examine the progression of the genus through geologic time (in terms of systematics), determine the extent to which distribution of this genus is restricted in the Oligocene of Florida, and describe the species found in the Suwanee Limestone. She has also used micro-CT to scan additional concretions as a non-destructive examination of these cephalopods, as traditional techniques can lead to destruction of the specimen inside. Once those scans are completed, they can be used in educational demonstrations and learning activities.




#### **STUDY GROUP**

### Shells & Shrimp Casserole submitted by Martha Dehne

1 16oz. box of medium shell pasta cooked al dente
1&1/2-2 pounds of cooked shrimp (the more the merrier!)
1 can cream of shrimp condensed soup
1 can cream of cheddar condensed soup

1 small onion finely chopped
1 cup milk
2 T Old Bay
