### Mini-Shell Show in February—

Here is a reminder of the details for the Mini-Shell Show we will be having at the February meeting. Select a 17" x10.5" shirt box. Line the bottom of the box with colored paper to set off your shells and signs. Select your favorite shell or shells and display them in the box. You can stick them in with any type of removable adhesive (so you can retrieve your shells without blemish after the show). For every shell displayed, you should have a sign that includes common name of the shell, scientific name, name of the original describer of the shell, the date the shell was originally catalogued and the geographic origin of the shell. In addition you could indicate the primary habitat of the shell and include information about where you found your shell, but that is optional. For example: American or Common Jingle Shell, Anomia simplex, Orbigny, 1842. Eastern United States to Brazil. Shallow water. Manasota Key, FL. Notice the correct scientific notation. Italic type is used if you have a printed sign. The genus name (first word) is capitalized; the species name (second word) is not capitalized. If you choose to include only one shell, you may wish to tell us other interesting things about the shell to fill up the shirt box display.

#### The Naked Snail—By Debbie Freeman

Many of you on the Carefree Learner trip in December were lucky enough to see a Nudibranch, also known as a snail without a shell. Actually, when young they do have a residual shell that is shed during adulthood. Taxonomic classification is the Phylum Mollusca; Class Gastropoda; Subclass Opisthobranchia; Order Nudibranchia. There are over 3000 species of Nudibranch worldwide, and most are pretty small with the exception of the Spanish Dancer that can grow to about 19 inches. They are hermaphroditic, having both male and female sex organs. Most live in shallow water, and are often found in tide pools. Nudibranch are famous for their colorful bodies, and beautiful feather-like gills. Our trips to the sand flats are always an adventure, but if you keep a sharp eve you may just find a special treat, like the unusual Nudibranch.To learn more about Nudibranch: www.cybereff.com or www. medslug.de/E/Linkbran.htm.
