Upcoming Programs

We have two more top-tier speakers to call to your attention thanks to the efforts of several ESC members who keep a keen eye out for great speakers. We are planning book signings at each of our next two meetings, and some books by the respective authors will be available for sale.

Please note the date change for our Feb. General Meeting; it was moved to March 2. This means we will have two General Meetings in March. Our regular March General Meeting still stands on March 23. On March 23, we will have a presentation on Sailor Valentines by Anita Wilson, Debbie Freeman, and Ruth Middlebrooks. Details will appear in our March ESC newsletter.

"Florida Fossils" by Dr. Gary Schmelz, Tuesday, January 26.

Dr. Gary Schmelz is our speaker on Tuesday, January 26 and his topic is Florida fossils. He will use a PowerPoint presentation to review the formation of the Florida peninsulas, examine the different types of vertebrate and invertebrate fossils found in different formations, and will discuss some future changes to the Florida peninsula. He will bring some examples of fossils from different formations, as well as, show us some literature for identifying fossils.

Dr. Schmelz has written dozens of natural history articles for *Gulfshore Life Magazine*. Currently, Dr. Schmelz is a Field Research Associate with the University of Florida where his main investigative interests are in the area of paleomalocology. To date, he has described 31 new species of fossil marine mollusks. His most recent scientific writings appeared in *The Nautilus*. Other accomplishments include: publication of *The Gift*, a young adult novel; assistance with the establishment of the Marjory Stoneman Douglas Nature Center on Key Biscayne; and publication of the book *Native Wildflowers of Collier County*. More recently he has co-authored the booklet *Mollusca of the Florida Shoal River Formation*. Dr. Schmelz is presently President of the Baily-Matthews Shell Museum, Sanibel Island, FL; and was a former professor at Edison College where he taught marine biology, oceanography, ecology, and biology. He also finished publication of his second flower book *Common Native Wildflowers of SW Florida*. You are welcome to bring one of his books for him to sign at the meeting, some may be available for sale at the meeting.


"Of Fabled Shells and Eastern Promise" by Dance and Wittkopf, Tuesday, March 2.

"Of Fabled Shells and Eastern Promise" is the title of our March 2nd program, which will be presented by world-renowned shellers, authors, speakers and best friends, S. Peter Dance and Harlan E. Wittkopf.

Harlan will open with humorous anecdotes about Peter and himself, leading into Peter's talk featuring his relationship with Don Bosch and some once-in-a-life-time

shelling in the waters around Oman on the Eastern side of the Arabian peninsula and its islands, including Masirah. Harlan, who is known as the "King of Sanibel Beachcombers," will then close with some tips on shelling.

November's Program

Homer Rhode Talks Land Snails

Homer Rhode, ESC's November speaker and worldwide sheller, took club members to Florida's Everglades and Keys and then transported us to Okinawa, the Philippines, New Guinea, the Solomon Islands, Java, Cuba, American Samoa, Jamaica and Indonesia in 30 minutes of fascinating facts and beautiful land snails. After the program he mentioned off-hand that he has even found shells in Antarctica! Homer pointed out that land snails are found almost everywhere in trees, leaf litter and on rocks.



Homer began his talk with a slide of a 200 year old *Helicostyla gilva* shell in his collection that has a personally written Sowerby description that is more than 145 years old! He showed pictures of the largest land snail, *Achatina fulica*, which can grow six inches long and also a nearly microscopic white, spiny spiral *Blaesopira* which was also a feature of the case of shells he brought for club members to view.

Homer has land snails of every color from the brilliant chartreuse green *Papustyle* of New Guinea to brilliant yellows and reds of Cuba. Many have spiral patterns, while others have patterns that resemble zebra camouflage.



He pointed out that both the green shells and brown and white patterned shells hide perfectly among the leaves and earth tones of their surroundings. He has shells of many shapes, including a sexually dimorphic Vienna snail and a Amphidromus pervusus which has both senestral and regular forms. He found one Nerites in the Solomon Islands more than a mile from water, even though all other Nerites are marine shells. Homer has gone to great lengths to add to his collection; in one case he befriended a local man who was felling trees to build a house; that was the only way he could find Partula snails living in the treetop canopy. Homer shared his extensive collection of Florida and Cuban Linguus shells. He pointed out that Florida does get new resident shells, often from imported plants. For example, the Puerto Rican Pleurodoonte marginella shell has spread throughout the Everglades and Keys. There are about 200 species and forms of land snails in Florida now. Homer also gave several examples of shells whose total populations are found only within a few hundred square feet; Jamaica alone has 1100 endemic species.

Club members are indebted to Homer for sharing his stories and expertise with the group. Thanks, Homer! We can't wait to have you back to discuss another mollusk topic with us!
