President's Profile

I am married with two children. My son, Shannon, is in medical research at the University of TN Medical Center, Knoxville; and my daughter, Hilary, is an architect in Portland, OR. She and her husband, Shannon (no kidding), have two children: my wonderful granddaughter, Isabella, who is eight and my incomparable grandson, Zeke, who is five. My husband, Max, and I have lived in Englewood for 6 years. We came from Chattanooga, TN where I taught Art at high school and college levels for 25 years and had previous teaching assignments in Florida and Hawaii. I also traveled internationally.

My interests, other than collecting and studying shells, are computers, art, photography, swimming daily laps, and designing and making jewelry.

My greatest accomplishment is a recent mosaic mural project I designed and directed for the Tennessee Riverpark in Chattanooga. Over a period of 14 years, I worked with 37 area schools and over 10,000 participants to create mosaic murals in the Park. The theme was "A School of Fish" and each participant created one unique, original mosaic fish. Participants ranged in age from 3 to 83. My team of art teachers and I used the original fish to create linear compositions of fish swimming in a river of glass. These bands encircled 29 buildings, columns, shelters, pavilions, restrooms, ranger stations and community centers. I completed the project last summer doing much of the work here in Englewood and commuting to Chattanooga for installation. Friend and design team member Mary Brown, assisted in my absence.

I am permanently at home in Englewood. I love the area, the climate and especially the many wonderful friends I have made here.

Shelling wasn't the greatest as we had few storms and (fortunately) no hurricanes to stir up the Gulf waters, but we had lots of time to socialize, and some terrific lunches together as well!





Since We Last Met

A shell without a shell? The Nature Walk with Bud Doyle in March was at the North Jetty in Nokomis. We experienced the first southwest wind of the season with strong gusts up to 30 mph. The winds were so strong that the osprey nest we saw blew down from the "Slow Speed" channel marker; two of the three baby osprey we saw survived the ordeal. Shown here are a few of our members listening to Bud describe the unusual and common items found on the shore, including balls of clay that were really from oil spills in the Gulf, (they looked like alligator dung and melted in hot sun), and sea squirts.

Who knew? Kathi Rader-Gibson, Park Naturalist, Lemon Bay Park, was our March General Meeting guest speaker and presented information about Lemon Bay and other area parks. Lemon Bay Park has an eagle's nest, visible from one of the main walking paths, an outdoor picnic pavilion and a small outdoor arena. The trails lead to the water's edge and you can even see live shells at low tide on the shoreline. Take a minute to enjoy the Park either before or after one of our meetings as there is really a lot to see and enjoy, including rare scrub jays.

Dig in! Shell club members enjoyed a dinner after the second fossil pit shelling excursion in April. The trip was in Collier County and we are fortunate to have the trip leader, Dr. Gary Schmelz, as our guest speaker this January.

At the pits. Shown here is Ruth Middlebrooks, cochair of excursions, talking with one of the trip leaders and club members about the fossil trip. They are "down in the pits" and fortunately no one lost a shoe or got stuck in the muck. The group did have some great finds and hopefully, they will bring them to Gary's meeting to show to everyone.

Three guys grilling! Yes, we had a lot of fun at the annual picnic held at the end of April. Shown here are the three chefs: Ken McLean, Bob Steele, and Jim Boyd. They graciously volunteered their time and grilled several dozen burgers for us. They also shared their fun sense of humor and quick wit. Thanks guys for all the help and for the laughs!

The unsinkable. Amie Barnicle instructed members Jackie McLean, Eileen Tabone, and Carol Roberts on the rules of kayaking. This is a great way to look for shells, especially at parks near uninhabited islands and places with shorelines inaccessible by foot. Amie is a certified kayak instructor and willing to schedule kayak shelling trips for those who go through a kayak training course. (See sign up at mtgs.)

Show and tell. Nearly 50 members participated in the shelling excursion to Egmont Key in March. The trip was fun as some of the shellers came home with buckets filled with shells. We had an early ferry ride to the Key ahead of the general public, thanks to the great planning of Ruth Middlebrooks, excursions co-chair. This is a trip we'll want to repeat.

Gone shell'n. Members Linda Maggiore and Ginny La Branche spent time shelling this August at Mt. Desert Island in Acadia National Park, Bar Harbor, Maine. They reported finding many snails and mussels.

And the number is...Rita Stonehouse, Linda Powers, and Judy Green (not shown) joined others on Sept. 12 for the inaugural scallop count in Lemon Bay. The count was conducted north of the Tom Adams Bridge to Gasparilla Sound. The count produced 94 scallops and was sponsored by a Charlotte County Sea Grant to foster healthy bays.

In August, the 2nd Annual Sarasota Bay Great Scallop Search resulted in approximately 136 scallops. Last year the count was almost 900. Both of the Bays are sensitive to runoff, red tides, and pollutants. Recent efforts to manage the environmental effects are working. Healthier conditions exist for the bivalves and counts will fluctuate annually.

Leal shares this photo and memorable moment as a result of the COA conference: "During the last COA convention in Clearwater, I mentioned casually to Brazilian shell dealer Marcus Coltro ("Femorale") that, as a museum professional, I opted not to have a shell collection. In that conversation, I said that I particularly missed not having any of the spe-

cies I named. Three weeks later, I received from Marcus and his brother, Jose' Coltro this AWESOME shell of Odontocymbiola simulatrix Leal & Bouchet, 1989, from off Itajai, Santa Catrina state, Brazil, measuring 205 mm. (O. simulatrix is the largest species I named so far!) What a present to celebrate the 20 years of naming that species!"




"Worldwide Landsnails" is the title of Homer Rhode's program for the Tuesday, November 24 meeting. Although Homer and Ann Rhode have been club members for only a short time, they have collected worldwide marine and landsnails for about 40 years. He has 10 marine collecting programs and 3 landsnail programs which he presents around the state, nation and at COA. Homer says he will share the best of the 3 landsnail programs with us!!! In addition to collecting and speaking about mollusks, Homer has been a scientific

judge for more than 20 shell shows. From the escargot we love to eat; to the Philippine, Cuban and Florida tree snails; to fresh water mussels and the apple snails that are the sole food of the snail kite in the Everglades; to the ramshorn snails in our yards; to Euglandina and waxy polygyra; Homer will teach us much and answer many questions we all have. Excursions

Carefree Learner.

The *Carefree Learner* is a boat that is set to sail on Thursday, December 3, and Friday, January 29. Debbie Freeman arranged the excursions again this year based on date availability and low tide readings for Sarasota Bay. This is one of the most popular trips and we try to arrange it annually.

The excursions leave out of Sarasota Harbor near the Marina Jack Restaurant and travels during low tide to sandbars in Sarasota Harbor behind homes near Mote Marine. The boat is owned by Sarasota High School and is used by students and others to study marine life in the Bay. You leave early, but it is one of the more interesting live shell excursions we offer. Dress accordingly as it may be cool when you leave early in the morning. You are allowed to take home two live shells of any species and all the empty shells you find. Bring a bucket to hold your shells and plan to wear shoes in the water while you go wading. The boat only seats 12 so sign up fast for this fun trip. Coupons are near the end of the newsletter for both excursions. Complete the coupon and send it in with your check by the due date.







Margarita Island, Venezuela.

This year an international trip to Margarita Island off of Venezuela is planned by Linda Powers.
