

## ENGLEWOOD SHELL CLUB—Minutes of the General Meeting January 21, 2014

President, Debbie Freeman, called the January 21, 2014 meeting to order promptly at 1:00 p.m.

Kathryn Gudgel, program chair, introduced our speaker Ron Bopp. Ron resides in Bradenton. He presented a program entitled "Chasing Florida Fossil Seashells". Ron told us where we might find fossil shells including shell piles used for roadways and buying shells online. Ron explained how to clean fossils shells, identify them and ways to display them at home. He commented that the only downside to collecting fossil shells is that you run out of room and they contain no edible meat. Ron brought examples of fossil shells for us to look at during the break. He was presented an Englewood Shell Club cap in appreciation.

Debbie Freeman announced that two ESC members won awards at the Melbourne Astronaut Trail Shell Show. In the artistic category: The Ultimate Astronaut Trail Shell Club Arts and Crafts Award: Charles Barr of Boca Grande, Florida. Beach walks: The next beach walk will be February 12<sup>th</sup> at 10:00 a.m. at Stump Pass.

Communication: Debbie Freeman reported for MaryLinda Coward that the newsletter contains fewer graphics so that it's easier to print out. The deadline for the next issue is February 19<sup>th</sup>.

Outreach: Amie Barnacle reported they have two events scheduled. The first one is February 7<sup>th</sup> at the Elsie Quirk Library and the other is March 17<sup>th</sup> at Boca Grande. They will have a shell and a shell craft display.

Study Group: Debbie Freeman said they have been busy taking pictures for the website. They have at least 22 shell pictures taken and identified. They will try to finish this project next month.

The board recommended the following donations of \$100 each to Elsie Quirk Library, Cedar Point Park, Bailey Mathews Museum, Sarasota High School's Carefree Learner, COA Education grant and the Elks Club for the scholarship fund or youth camp. Unanimously agreed.

The nominating committee of Suzanne Skalski, Linda Hamilton, and Ruth Middlebrooks will present a slate of officers next month. There will be an opportunity for nominations from the floor. Voting will be at the March meeting.

Ron Bopp reminded members of the Sarasota Shell Show on February 14<sup>th</sup>, 15<sup>th</sup>, and 16<sup>th</sup>.

Shell of the month: Anita Wilson told the story of the "pink heel splitter" one of the mussels of the upper Mississippi River basin. Half of the fresh water mussels there are threatened by dams, pollution, and the over use of them for buttons. They also have restrictive reproduction requirements.

Door prize drawing for shells was held.

President, Debbie Freeman adjourned the meeting at 2:40.
